"The Scandal of the Sacred: Early Christian Ascetic Women"



Elizabeth A. Clark is John Carlisle Kilgo Professor of Religion at Duke University. Clark's influential scholarship includes studies of asceticism, ancient biblical interpretation, women in ancient Christianity, and Augustine on marriage and sexuality. Her most recent book is *History, Theory, Text: Historians and the Linguistic Turn* (2004).

"Spirits and Visions: The Scandals of Religious Women" with co-presenters



Yvonne Chireau is Associate Professor of Religion at Swarthmore College, specializing in African American religions and religion in America. The author of *Black Magic: African American Religion and Conjuring Tradition* (2003), Chireau has published a range of studies of healing, magic, and alternative supernatural traditions among African Americans.



Jane Crosthwaite is Professor of Religion at Mount Holyoke College. She specializes in women in American religious history, feminist theologies, and Shaker history and art. An alumna and former faculty member at Wake Forest, Crosthwaite is currently researching nineteenth-century drawings by the Shaker sisters and has co-edited *Millennial Praises: A Shaker Hymnal* (forthcoming).

Emilie M. Townes is Andrew W. Mellon Professor of African American Religion and Theology at Yale Divinity School. Townes' many respected works include *Womanist Ethics and the Cultural Production of Evil* (2006) and wide-ranging studies of religion, health and healing, Christian social ethics, and African American religious experience.

"A Scandalous Woman, Who Can Find?" with co-presenters



Wilma Bailey is Professor of Hebrew and Aramaic Scripture at Christian Theological Seminary in Indianapolis. Bailey's writings include *"You Shall Not Kill" or "You Shall Not Murder"?: The Assault on a Biblical Text* (2005), as well as studies of lament traditions, comparing the Hebrew Bible with laments of enslaved African American women.



Phyllis Tribble is University Professor at Wake Forest School of Divinity and Baldwin Professor of Sacred Literature Emerita at Union Theological Seminary in New York. Her books include *God and the Rhetoric of Sexuality; Texts of Terror: Literary-Feminist Readings of Biblical Narrative; Rhetorical Criticism: Context, Method, and the Book of Jonah;* and *Hagar, Sarah, and Their Children*, co-edited with Letty M. Russell.
